KEY FINDINGS: WHY COUNCILS SUPPORT CLH

- 1. Housing supply; permanently affordable homes
- 2. Regeneration; returns empty homes to use
- 3. Empowers communities: sustainable, cohesive
- 4. Involves residents in addressing housing need
- 5. CLH brings resources into the area



WHAT NEXT?

- 1. Leadership (political and officer) is key
- 2. LA policy environment supportive for CLH
- 3. Land made available through planning policy
- 4. Council assets: sale, lease or asset transfer
- 5. Funding: revenue & capital
- 6. Enabling support directly or through partners

ECDC context

- Delivery of affordable housing through Rural Exception Policy had been limited
- Development sites unpopular with 'locals' seen as being done unto
- Communities across the district shared similar problems
- Keen to facilitate but NOT control

Why is community-led development an answer?

- * Projects driven by local communities can:
 - * Address specific local issues with 'right for place' solutions
 - Overcome objections to planning
 - Deliver additional growth
- * Community ownership of assets can:
 - Create income streams for local re-investment and long term enduring change
 - * Build resilient communities with capacity to respond to future challenges

- Stronger proposals





Why is Community Led Housing important to Leeds?

- Offers a dynamic and innovative route to housing growth, contributing towards the delivery of the city's housing target;
- An integral part of a balanced strategy to provide a range of housing options, complementary to that provided by the volume housebuilders;
- Collaboration with the sector is seen as an exciting opportunity, providing a number of benefits for the city as well as increasing community confidence and cohesion;
- There is a growing community led housing sector in Leeds and the Council
 is committed to support build the sector further, demonstrated by signing
 up to the CCIN Local Authority Pledge.



Examples of Community Led Housing activityin Leeds

Empty Properties

 Third Sector Providers supported through c£900k Right to Buy Replacement Funding to acquire and refurbish 32 units

Long Term Leases

 LCC has leased 92 properties for 99 years at a peppercorn rent to Third Sector organisations in order to raise finance to acquire and refurbish more long term, empty homes

S106 Affordable Housing Units

 The Council worked Leeds Community Homes to put arrangements in places regarding the acquisition of the s106 Affordable Housing units at the Climate Innovation District development



Examples of Community Led Housing activity in Leeds

Leeds Community Homes

• Vision to support the creation of 1,000 new affordable homes over the next 10 years and currently scoping a demonstrator scheme on construction and tenure types

Lilac

The UK's first affordable ecological cohousing project

ChaCo

- Planning approved for a 34 unit co-housing scheme, with 4 self-build plots
- Site being co-developed with a Registered Provider, who will build an over 55's scheme alongside the community led housing
- Housing Infrastructure Fund bid for to support abnormal and development costs

New Wortley Community Association

 Ambition to deliver community owned and managed housing in one of the priority social regeneration areas in Leeds, which is ranked as one of the most deprived in the country in the IoMD.

Past....

- Brighton & Hove City Council has a long history of supporting community-led housing with relationships built over many years
- First wave of self build schemes in 1990s using timber frame construction
- Local housing co-ops buying and leasing properties across the city
- More recent past support for the empty homes community programme led to purchases of houses for local housing cooperatives
- Renewal of lease for twenty years for established Housing Co-op at council site

Present....

- Council's Housing Strategy 2015 recognises the community housing sector as a partner in meeting it's priority to 'improving housing supply'
- Community Housing rep on Strategic Housing partnership
- Community-led Housing referenced in the council's adopted City Plan Part 1
- Council's Fairness Commission Report 2016 recommendations on funding, advice and enabling access to sites
- Council support setting up the BHCLT Community-Led Housing Programme through the Community Housing Fund and council representation on the Steering Committee

Future...

- BHCLT Community-Led Housing Programme staffed and active
- Announcement of further DCLG funding imminent
- Self-build co-op scheme on council land to start on site June 2018 providing 2 family houses and nomination rights
- Council to continue working closely with CLH partners to identify sites and support creative opportunities to provide . . .
- More community-led housing in the city.








Successes
