Welcome from Baroness Taylor of Stevenage

Leader of Stevenage Borough Council Chair of the Cooperative Councils' Innovation Network (CCIN)

Many of you will know by now that I am absolutely honoured and delighted to have been nominated by Sir Keir Starmer to enter the House of Lords as a working Labour and Co-operative Peer.

I take up my seat at the end of October. That means I shall be stepping down as Leader at Stevenage at the end of December, which means I shall no longer be eligible to be Chair of the Cooperative Councils' Innovation Network. Arrangements are being made to appoint a new Chair.

I couldn't be prouder of how our Network has developed over the last ten years since it was founded by Steve Reed MP, Jim McMahon MP and myself. We wanted to demonstrate the power of cooperation in action in our councils and communities and to share the unique energy that cooperation brings with our fellow councillors and their councils.

Ten years later, we could never have imagined the strength and innovation that characterises our Network today. Our huge membership of 47 councils ranges from the largest council in Europe, Birmingham City Council and councils representing our other major UK cities to our partners in town, parish and community councils who are developing best cooperative practices in the heart of their communities. We are also fortunate to have a wide range of Affiliate Members who share our values and support our work.

From the three councils that started our Network, we now cover populations totalling 9.8m people and have combined budgets of £17bn.

We have developed ground-breaking cooperative policy documents on topics as diverse as tackling climate change, supporting our communities through Covid, cooperative housing and cooperation in care services. And when we attend conferences and exhibitions, our case study books still disappear from our stand like hot cakes!

Our cooperative values and principles stay clear and strong, supported by our Values and Principles Board with membership from across the cooperative movement. Thank you to all our dedicated V&P members. In recent years we have developed a clear direction for the network



through our Executive Oversight Committee, including using our membership subscriptions to fund policy labs and prototypes, giving our councils the space to innovate without putting scarce council funds at risk.

It was the greatest pleasure when we exhibited at the Labour Party Conference in September to welcome new council members Hackney, Newham & Trafford, and a new Associate Member, Stoke Labour Group. As we continue to develop and share our cooperative practice, our members were delighted this year to attend our study visit to Mondragon in Spain, an internationally renowned cooperative community, and a group of our council leaders are actively working on community wealth building and what is needed to grow cooperative economies across the UK.

As we face the twin challenges of Covid recovery and the cost-of-living crisis, our members and their councils are reclaiming the traditions of community action, community engagement, and civic empowerment that can transform communities.

Thank you to all those who have contributed to our Network over our ten years with commitment, energy and passion for our values. I will no longer be your Chair, but I shall remain your incredibly proud founder and continue to be inspired by what our Network achieves.

Here's to the next ten years of cooperation in action!

Introduction

The Cooperative Councils' Innovation Network is a Special Interest Group of the Local Government Association (LGA), and its membership is open to all UK councils. Members of the Network are local authorities committed to reforming the way they work by building an equal partnership with local people, driving real innovation.

Town, parish and community councils and opposition groups are also welcomed as Associate Members.

Our Affiliate Members are a growing group of values-based non-governmental organisations and corporations wishing to show their support and engage in the processes of developing innovative Cooperative Councils.

As a Network, we strive to ensure that our member councils uphold and strengthen the cooperative values and principles of the International Cooperative Alliance. Our membership approval process and self-assessment process reflects this commitment.

Cooperative Councils believe that the unprecedented challenges facing the public

sector and local communities mean that traditional models of top-down governance and economic growth are no longer fit for purpose. The founding traditions of the cooperative movement – collective action and cooperation, empowerment, and enterprise – offer a foundation for fresh and innovative solutions to tackle today's challenges.

We want to reclaim the traditions of community action, community engagement and civic empowerment, which can transform communities. This approach will help us deliver radical and innovative programmes designed, led, and delivered in partnership with communities and other sector partners, maximising the social dividend they bring. It has also always been the purpose of the Network to share our developing good practice and support one another in our cooperative aims and values.

Although drawing on traditions, much of this remains unchartered territory for local government. Members of the Network are committed to helping each other translate cooperative principles into solutions that work for our communities and places.

CCIN Statement of Values and Principles



Our values are what we believe in

Whilst not a registered cooperative, the Cooperative Councils' Innovation Network has adopted the Cooperative **Values** developed by the International Cooperative Alliance:

Cooperatives are based on the values of self-help, self-responsibility, democracy, equality, equity, and solidarity. In the tradition of their founders, cooperative members believe in the ethical values of honesty, openness, social responsibility and caring for others.

Our **Principles** guide the way we, and our members, put our **Values** into action.

The Cooperative Councils' Innovation Network endorses the Principles of the International Cooperative Alliance:

- Voluntary and open membership
- Democratic member control
- Member economic participation
- Autonomy and independence

- Education, training, and information
- Cooperation among cooperatives; and concern for community.

In acknowledging that councils are not in themselves registered cooperatives, our members and we have developed Principles that have grown from those of the International Cooperative Alliance and are relevant within the context of local government.



The icons are used to indicate how Cooperative Councils are putting our Cooperative Principles into practice, demonstrating the 'cooperative difference' in the work that they are doing.

Councils and organisations who receive CCIN funding to undertake Policy Labs and Policy Prototypes are asked to adopt these icons to show the 'cooperative difference' from this policy work.

Highlights of the Year

By the end of July 2022, there were 34 Full Council Members, 22 Associate Members (including ten Town and Parish Councils), and 44 Affiliate Members. Cooperative Council Members (excluding GMCA) represent 9.1m citizens and control a budget of £15bn. There are also 21 Supporters, both individuals and organisations.

CCIN's profile has continued to grow, and there has been a marked increase in interest in the valuable contribution that the Network's Members are making to municipal policy development, particularly in a post-Covid world.

Highlights include:

- Positioned the CCIN as the fastest growing 'cross-sector' Network in local government
- The Leaders and Cooperative Leads Group articulated what it means to be a Cooperative Council
- Session to promote regional cooperative banks
- Launched new website
- Approved four Policy Labs and one Policy Prototype
- Shared over 420 Case Studies with a new Case Studies Pack
- Launched three Policy Lab Reports
 - Understanding the Digital Divide
 - Cooperative Approaches to Reaching Net Zero
 - Cooperative Difference in Care
- Produced a pamphlet for events introducing the CCIN and its Policy Labs
- Approved revised CCIN Constitution



Governance and Structure

The Network is politically driven, with elected councillors chairing and forming the Executive Oversight Committee and Values and Principles Board together with representatives of our Affiliate Membership.

Executive Oversight Committee

The Executive Oversight Committee (EOC) holds delegated powers to manage Network affairs on behalf of all members. The Chair of the EOC is Councillor Sharon Taylor OBE, Leader of Stevenage Borough Council.

The purpose of the EOC is to

- Drive forward Cooperative Policy Development on behalf of Network members.
- Make key decisions on Network priorities, for example, setting the scope of Policy Labs and Policy Prototypes.
- Oversee the development, review, approval and implementation of the CCIN's strategic direction.
- Raise the CCIN's profile, developing our influence and strengthen our policy impact.

- Oversee the Network budget, allocating spend and signing off the CCIN's annual accounts.
- Ensure that the Values and Principles Board is resourced and supported to carry out its functions.
- Manage the Network's reputation, giving consideration to issues, including member behaviour, which may impact the reputation of the CCIN.

Being a Cooperative Council

The Leaders/Cooperative Leads Group helps drive forward initiatives to grow the cooperative economy. The Group identified some key themes and actions that councils can take to grow their local economies; this is not an exclusive list but gives a good framework for these activities occurring across our membership. We have been using this listing on our website and in conversation with potential members throughout the year.

There are two key themes:

Community Wealth Building

- Develop an Inclusive Economy Charter
- Promote a progressive procurement policy
- Support the creation of a regional mutual/ community bank by investing
- Work with local anchor institutions to buy and recruit local
- Regulate rent and rates for local businesses in council-owned property
- Offer business rate rebates for those businesses that become Living Wage Accredited
- Champion local employment schemes
- Have insourcing council services as an objective

Cooperative Placemaking

- Develop a cooperative development strategy
- Establish a cooperative development network
- Commit to community engagement in local decision making including participatory budgeting
- Invest in local community production, particularly those focusing on community energy to tackle the climate emergency
- Promote the circular economy
- Support local enterprises to convert into coops/ worker coops
- Have an Asset Transfer policy to manage land and assets which support Community Land Trusts


To support these **key themes**, the CCIN has developed a **training programme** with the Co-operative College for councillors and officers to help explain the concepts. More on page 24.

New website

Launched in February 2022, the new website better reflects the substantial increase in the size of the Network and the vast array of projects taking place to develop and grow the cooperative economy. It usefully focuses on what it means to be a Cooperative Council and has a growing wealth of resources to help councils grow the cooperative economy. The new website is easier to navigate, and its functionality reflects our Values and Principles using the new icons developed to illustrate the policy work being delivered.

Highlights include:

- All content is now fully searchable
- About Us, including Governance and Member Listings
- Membership info
- Training Courses for CCIN members offered by the CCIN, the Co-operative College, Co-operatives UK and Affiliate Members



- Funded Projects, Published and Active, which can be searched by Member, Date and Principles supported
- Growing the Coop Economy, including reports and resources developed by Network Members and partners
- Over 400 Case Studies and new functionality for members to upload their Case Studies
- Resources section, which includes Publications, Newsletters, News and Blogs
- Events are searchable for upcoming and past; new functionality allows members to upload their events onto the site.

Funded projects 2022

Each year CCIN Members can apply to deliver projects on behalf of the Network. This year, the budgets were increased, with larger Policy Labs now attracting up to £20,000. Here Full Council Members are encouraged to submit bids that can be delivered in partnership with other Members looking to find cooperative policy solutions to local government challenges. Smaller projects, known as Policy Prototypes, are defined to a specific locality and can attract up to £2,000.

Policy Lab Updates

For 2022 we welcomed bids from across the Network but were disappointed with the number of applications. Four Policy Lab bids were approved:

- Democratising Policy Solutions Lead: Rochdale MB Council
- 2. Art & Culture for Social Cohesion Lead: North Hertfordshire District Council

- 3. Study Visit to Mondragon for CCIN Members Led and organised by CCIN
- 4. Cooperative Development Toolkit Lead: Kirklees Council

Policy Prototype Updates

For 2022 we had an open call for Policy Prototype projects and had one submission approved:

 Translating Cooperative Values into 'Social Values' for Procurement – Lead: Oxford City Council

Publications

Cooperative Difference in Care

In 2021 we commissioned **Peopletoo**, an Affiliate Member, to analyse the findings of 15 of the Health and Social Care Policy Prototypes. These Policy Prototypes did not seek to respond to the entirety of the health and social care crisis facing local authorities. They were an opportunity to think creatively about specific areas where cooperative principles can provide a framework for innovative solutions that could be developed and shared across the wider Network.

The key output from this commission was the production of the **Cooperative Difference in Care** report. This report highlights the different approaches to cooperative working and how various organisations can include cooperative principles to help support communities and become part of a solution to the care crisis. The report highlights the significant amount of learning that can be taken from the projects supported by the CCIN, the global and local contexts, and academic research.

CCIN Members must also use this report to highlight to central government that cooperatives are a vital part of the solution to this country's care crisis. There needs to be increased recognition from central government as to the importance of preventative work in managing the demand local authorities face across social care and the critical role that cooperatives can play in supporting this. The report was launched in February 2022.

Understanding the Digital Divide


This report is a practical toolkit to help tackle digital poverty and the digital divide – the gap between those who can confidently and conveniently go online and those who cannot. It provides and signposts tools to build a more robust data picture of:


- who is experiencing digital exclusion
- where they are; and
- what their barriers are to accessing services and social contact online

And with that data picture in place, it described the interventions trialled and developed across several authority areas to promote digital engagement, compiling key documents and information for others to use.

Cooperative Approaches to Reaching Net Zero

Reaching Net Zero is the biggest and most crucial shared challenge we face globally and locally. We must work cooperatively to address it. The new report and toolkit Co-operative Approaches to Net Zero showcase some of the ways Cooperative Councils are already doing this – from citizens assemblies to community-backed eCargo bike schemes. The report provides resources to implement approaches most applicable to places that can be introduced rapidly.

Revised CCIN Constitution

The Network's Constitution was first written when the CCIN was established in 2012, and its Terms of Reference were last reviewed in 2016. The Network is now a very different organisation with a growing membership of Full Councils, Associates and Affiliates. A review of its Constitution and the Terms of Reference began in June 2021 and was approved at the 2021 AGM, held in February 2022.

The Revised Constitution clearly outlines the roles and responsibilities of both parts of the Governance and different Membership categories. It provides clear guidance on the election procedure and links to the Complaints procedure.



Officer Group

The Network has an Officer Group comprising Policy officers from councils in Full and Associate Membership. The Group meets monthly to share best practice and discuss cooperative approaches to common issues. The Group is chaired by Jonathan Downs, Corporate Policy Lead at Oldham Council.

Network support

Network support is provided by Nicola Huckerby, who manages the day-to-day operations and provides a central coordination point for the Network, which has grown from 19 member councils to 122 councils, political groups, organisations and supporters in the last six years.

Dynamic Purchasing System (DPS)

In April 2020, the Network launched its DPS. As Cooperative Councils, our members are at the cutting edge of policy innovation - and it can be a tough place to be. Councils often need to move quickly and flexibly to be on the front foot when it comes to 'doing things differently'. Sometimes it is necessary to bring in extra capacity and specific expertise to be able to do this, and there can also be a need to seek independent challenge to test assumptions and policy design. The CCIN recognises this and wants its members to be as enabled as possible to develop practical policy solutions as quickly and informed as possible - and this is where the DPS comes in.

A DPS is an entirely electronic system to purchase goods, works or services. Unlike a traditional framework, suppliers can apply to join at any time. It is an 'open market' solution designed to provide buyers with access to a pool of pre-qualified suppliers.

Our multi-supplier DPS allows all CCIN Members and Associate Members (and the CCIN itself) to select from a specialist, prescribed pool of

organisations to help develop policy, implement prototypes and build capacity, both in communities and inside the organisation.

The DPS period runs from 1 April 2020 to 31 March 2025. There's a User Guide along with details of who is on the DPS on the CCIN website:
