## **Welcome from Cllr Louise Gittins**

Leader of Cheshire West & Chester Council Chair of the Co-operative Councils' Innovation Network (CCIN)

It was an honour and a privilege to have been elected as the new Chair of the network at the end of 2022. I follow in the footsteps of Baroness Taylor of Stevenage who entered the House of Lords as a working Labour and Co-operative Peer at the end of October 2022. Sharon oversaw the amazing development of the Network over the last ten years since it was founded by Sharon, Steve Reed OBE MP and Jim McMahon OBE MP. They came together with a vision of demonstrating the power of cooperation in action in councils and communities and sharing the unique energy that cooperation brings with fellow councillors and their councils. I don't think ten years later, they could never have imagined the strength and innovation that characterises the Network today.

The network has continued to go from strength to strength, and over the last year, it has grown from 100 to 117 Members with 21 Supporters.

We have developed ground-breaking cooperative policy documents on topics as diverse as Growing an Inclusive Co-operative Economy, Community Economic Development Plans, and Cooperation at the Grassroots. We also organised a Study Visit to Mondragon in the Basque Country for members and officers to discover a truly cooperative region for themselves.

We have also attended conferences and exhibitions and our case study books still disappear from our stand like hot cakes! This year we welcomed two new Welsh members Llanelli Town Council and Swansea Council, who joined following the Welsh Labour Conference in March. And the LGA Conference was our most successful to date, with Darlington and Swindon joining before our year's end.

Our cooperative values and principles stay clear and strong, supported by our Values and Principles Board with membership from across the cooperative movement. Thank you to all our dedicated V&P members.

I have had the pleasure of chairing our Executive Oversight Committee, including using our membership subscriptions to fund policy labs and prototypes, giving our councils the space to innovate without putting scarce council funds



at risk. As we continue to develop and share our cooperative practice, our members were delighted this year to agree to fund our study visit to Emilia Romagna in Italy, an internationally renowned cooperative community, this visit will take place in March 2024.

Following on from our successful conference in Telford and Wrekin in 2022 where we discussed a range of topics from cooperative economies in Action, community wealth building in procurement, community energy and promoting the cooperative option this year will see the conference moving to Sunderland, with the focus on 'supporting communities – we are stronger together'.

As a network of councils, we are actively working on community wealth building and what is needed to grow cooperative economies across the UK. We are looking closely at community banking and what that could look like for our residents and SMEs.

As we face the ongoing challenge of the cost-of-living crisis, our members and their councils reclaim the traditions of community action, community engagement, and civic empowerment that can transform communities. Thank you to all those who have contributed to our Network over the last year and the 10 years before with commitment, energy and passion for our values.

# Introduction

Established in 2012, the Cooperative Councils' Innovation Network (CCIN) was the brain child of Steve Reed OBE, MP (now our Honorary President), who, together with Jim McMahon OBE, MP and Baroness Sharon Taylor OBE (both now Honorary Vice Presidents) turned the idea into reality. Today, the CCIN is the fastest-growing cross-party network in local government.

The Network is a Special Interest Group of the Local Government Association (LGA), and its membership is open to all UK Councils. Members of the Network are local authorities committed to reforming how they work by building an equal partnership with local people, driving real innovation.

Town, Parish and Community Councils, as well as Opposition Groups are also welcomed as Associate Members.

Our Affiliate Members are a growing group of values-based non-governmental organisations and corporations wishing to show their support and engage in the processes of developing innovative Cooperative Councils.

As a Network, we strive to ensure that our member councils uphold and strengthen the cooperative values and principles of the International Cooperative Alliance. Our membership approval

# **CCIN Statement of Values and Principles**



#### Our Values are what we believe in

While not a registered cooperative, the Cooperative Councils' Innovation Network has adopted the Cooperative **Values** developed by the International Cooperative Alliance:

Cooperatives are based on the values of self-help, self-responsibility, democracy, equality, equity, and solidarity. In the tradition of their founders, cooperative members believe in the ethical values of honesty, openness, social responsibility and caring for others.

# Our **Principles** guide the way we, and our members, put our **Values** into action

The Cooperative Councils' Innovation Network endorses the Principles of the International Cooperative Alliance:

- Voluntary and open membership
- Democratic member control
- Member economic participation
- Autonomy and independence

- Education, training, and information
- Cooperation among cooperatives; and concern for community.

In acknowledging that Councils are not in themselves registered co-operatives, we and our members have developed Principles that have grown from those of the International Cooperative Alliance and are relevant within the context of local government:

The icons (right) are used to indicate how Cooperative Councils are putting our Cooperative Principles into practice, demonstrating the `cooperative difference' in the work that they are doing.

- Social partnership We will strengthen the cooperative partnership between citizens, communities, enterprises, and Councils, based on a shared sense of responsibility for wellbeing and mutual benefit.
- 2. **Democratic engagement** We will support the active engagement of the full range of residents in decision-making and prioritysetting.
- 3. **Co-production** We will develop systems that enable citizens to be equal partners in designing and commissioning public services and determining public resource use.
- 4. Enterprise and social economy We will promote community-based approaches to economic development that focus on supporting the creation of jobs, social enterprises and other businesses and providing an environment for cooperative and mutual enterprises to thrive.
- 5. **Maximising social value** We will support the development of a framework and criteria for social value, giving substance to the concept and supporting Councils with the tools to ensure better local social and economic outcomes.
- 6. Community leadership and a new role for Councillors – We will explore ways for Councils to act as a platform for helping the community to contribute to local outcomes, and to re-think the role of councillors as community connectors, brokers, and leaders.
- 7. New models of meeting priority needs In exploring new ways of meeting the priority needs of our communities we will encourage models, such as co-operatives and mutuals, which give greater influence and voice to staff and users.

- 8. **Innovation** We will embrace innovation in how we work with local communities to drive positive change.
- Learning We will capture and 'expand' the experience and learning from individual projects and approaches to encourage broader application of cooperative principles within individual member Councils and across the Network.
- 10. **Walking the talk** As a membership organisation, we will make this statement of our principles operational by:
  - Cooperation among members: Our members work together to help each other implement our values, sharing experiences and learning
  - Openness of membership: Full, Associate and Affiliate Membership is open to any qualifying Council, organisation or individual who shares our values and is committed to putting them into action
  - Co-production of the Network's work: Members help shape the Network's work programme and the content of events and written products
  - Action-focused: The network is a vehicle for helping Councils translate cooperative values and principles into policy and practice
  - Membership-based: The network is majority funded by modest membership subscriptions from its member Councils, Associates and Affiliates
  - Non-party-political: Members share the belief that working cooperatively within and across communities holds the key to tackling today's challenges



# **Highlights of the Year**

By the end of July 2023, there were 45 Full Council Members, 23 Associate Members (including twelve Town, Parish & Community Councils), and 49 Affiliate Members. Co-operative Council Members (excluding GMCA) represent 11.7m citizens and control a budget of £19.3bn. There are also 21 Supporters, both individuals and organisations.

CCIN's profile has continued to grow, and there has been a marked increase in interest in the valuable contribution that the Network's Members are making to municipal policy development, particularly in a post-Covid world.

# **Governance and Structure**

The Network is politically led, with elected Councillors chairing and forming the Executive Oversight Committee (EOC) and Values and Principles (V&P) Board. Representatives of our Affiliate Membership are also elected to places on both EOC and V&P. The V&P Board also comprises representatives from the cooperative and trade union sector.

Elections for places on the Governance panels are held every two years, and were last held at the end of 2022. To find out more about the process, visit **bit.ly/ccin-eoc**.

#### **Executive Oversight Committee**

**The Executive Oversight Committee** (EOC) holds delegated powers to manage Network affairs on behalf of all members. Councillor Louise Gittins, Leader of Cheshire West & Chester Council, took over as Chair of the Network in January 2023. Cllr Gittins superseded Baroness Sharon Taylor, who was elevated to the House of Lords in October 2023. Baroness Taylor has served as Network Chair since 2017. We want to thank Baroness Taylor for her enormous contribution to the growth and direction of the Network in recent years.

The purpose of the EOC is to:

- Drive forward Cooperative Policy Development
  on behalf of Network Members
- Make key decisions on Network priorities, for example, setting the scope of Policy Labs and Policy Prototypes
- Oversee the development, review, approval and implementation of the CCIN's strategic direction
- Raise the CCIN's profile, developing our influence and strengthen our policy impact

- Oversee the Network budget, allocating spend and signing off the CCIN's annual accounts
- Ensure that the Values and Principles Board is resourced and supported to carry out its functions
- Manage the Network's reputation, giving consideration to issues, including Member behaviour, which may impact the reputation of the CCIN.

# **Being a Cooperative Council**

The Leaders/Cooperative Leads Group helps drive forward initiatives to grow the cooperative economy. The Group identified some key themes and actions that Councils can take to grow their local economies; this is not an exhaustive list but gives a good framework for these activities occurring across our membership. We have been using this listing on our website and in conversations with potential members throughout the year.

#### There are two key themes:

#### **Community Wealth Building**

- Develop an Inclusive Economy Charter
- Promote a progressive procurement policy
- Support the creation of a regional mutual/ community bank by investing
- Work with local anchor institutions to buy and recruit local
- Regulate rent and rates for `local' businesses in Council-owned property
- Offer business rate rebates for those businesses that become Living Wage Accredited
- Champion Local Employment schemes
- Have insourcing Council services as an objective

#### **Cooperative Placemaking**

- Develop a cooperative development strategy
- Establish a cooperative development network
- Commit to community engagement in local decision making including participatory budgeting
- Invest in local community production, particularly those focusing on community energy to tackle the climate emergency
- Promote the circular economy
- Support local enterprises to convert into co-ops/worker co-ops
- Have an Asset Transfer policy to manage land and assets which support Community Land Trusts

To support these **key themes**, the CCIN has developed a **training programme** with the Co-operative College for Councillors and officers to help explain the concepts. More on page 24.

# Funded projects 2023

Each year CCIN Members can apply to deliver projects on behalf of the Network. Full Councils are encouraged to submit bids that can be delivered in partnership with other Members looking to find cooperative policy solutions to local government challenges. These attract up to £20,000. Smaller projects, known as Policy Prototypes, are defined to a specific locality and can attract up to £2,000.

#### Policy Lab Updates

For 2022 we welcomed bids from across the Network but were disappointed with the number of applications. Four Policy Lab bids were approved:

# **Publications**

#### Community Economic Development Plans as a tool for fostering co-operative working between councils and the community

Community economic development planning or CEDP is a process of economic development within a specific geographic area, to make the economy in that area work well for that community.

Within CEDP three important attributes are emphasised:

- The overall focus is the economy. Community economic development is all about reshaping the underlying economic system in a place, rather than working on improving people's capacity to live well within the existing environment.
- 2. The economy is a means to an end, not an end in itself. Rather than emphasising economic growth as the end goal of local economic development, a CEDP approach is interested in economic development, which generates human wellbeing within environmental limits, at a community level.
- 3. It's led by the community. In CEDP, the power to drive the change rests within the community of residents, local businesses, local service providers including councils, community groups and voluntary sector organisations with a direct stake in the economic health of that area.

This report was prepared by **Co-operative Futures** on behalf of **Birmingham City Council** who led the project. The case studies outlined in this report demonstrate the value to Local Authorities of working in cooperation with communities to undertake community economic development planning.

### Cooperation at the Grassroots

The partner councils (**Burntwood Town Council**, **North Herts District Council**, **Stevenage Borough Council** and **Sunderland City Council**) worked together to demonstrate how cooperative councils can embed neighbourhood working to deliver better outcomes and better value for money, through a cooperative model of organisation and delivery at a local level.

All four councils differ in size, scope and resources and have been using the term of the policy lab to design and develop better ways of working cooperatively within their communities.

Thank you to all of the Councils that participated in this work: **Burntwood Town Council**, **North Herts District Council**, **Stevenage Borough Council** and **Sunderland City Council**.

#### Growing an inclusive Cooperative Economy

The steering group led by **Oxford City Council** delivered a test and learn pilot on cooperative mapping, looking at creating a directory of cooperatives in the city's areas of deprivation. To promote co-op growth, this directory can be shared with large anchor institutions' procurement teams to prioritise when choosing suppliers to generate local, social value.

**Torbay Council** and **Stevenage Borough Council** were also both steering group members. They delivered test and learn pilots in Torbay, focusing on care cooperative development, and in Stevenage, on social inclusion.

Approaches included promoting community wealth-building and inclusive economy initiatives focusing on embedding social value in procurement across anchor organisations; community mapping; financial support; advice, and awareness-raising.

#### Study Visit to Mondragon

The CCIN led a study visit to the Mondragon Corporation in the Basque Country in October 2022. Over two intensive days, 15 delegates underwent an immersive experience visiting their headquarters, Industrial and R&D enterprises, and the university campus.

MONDRAGON is the outcome of a cooperative business project launched in 1956. Their website describes itself as "a dedicated group of people with a cooperative identity forming a business group that is profitable, competitive and enterprising, capable of successfully operating in global markets. Our organisation uses democratic


The Network has an 'Officer Group' comprising Policy officers from Full and Associate Membership councils. The Group meet monthly to share best practice and discuss cooperative approaches to common issues. The Group is chaired by Jonathan Downs, the Corporate Policy Lead at Oldham Council on behalf of the Accountable Body. methods in its corporate organisation, and its aims are employment, the personal and professional advancement of its workers, and the development of its community."

# **Dynamic Purchasing System (DPS)**

In April 2020, the Network launched its DPS. As Cooperative Councils, our members are at the cutting edge of policy innovation – and it can be a tough place to be. Councils often need to move quickly and flexibly to be on the front foot when it comes to 'doing things differently'. Sometimes it is necessary to bring in extra capacity and specific expertise to be able to do this, and there can also be a need to seek independent challenges to test assumptions and policy design. The CCIN recognises this and wants its members to be as enabled as possible to develop practical policy solutions as quickly and informed as possible – and this is where the DPS comes in.

A DPS is an entirely electronic system to purchase goods, works or services. Unlike a traditional framework, suppliers can apply to join at any time. It is an 'open market' solution designed to provide buyers with access to a pool of pre-qualified suppliers.

Our multi-supplier DPS allows all CCIN Members and Associate Members (and the CCIN itself) to select from a specialist, prescribed pool of organisations to help develop policy, implement prototypes and build capacity in communities and inside the organisation. The DPS period runs from 1 April 2020 to 31 March 2025. There's a User Guide along with details of who is on the DPS on the CCIN website: **www.councils.coop/dps**.

- Fringe at the Co-operative Party Local Government Conference


In July, we kickstarted our **Coop Option Training** with an introduction to alternative business models and the related support landscape. A funded Policy Lab, these online sessions were organised by **Kirklees Council** and delivered by **Stir to Action** and **Coop Culture**. The CCIN has funded 84 places across three courses, aiming to increase understanding by council officers and other stakeholders of the `cooperative option'.

In 2022/3, we attended more in-person events with exhibition stands at conferences in England, Scotland, and Wales. Our event strategy has proven to be the perfect opportunity for us to meet up with members and introduce the Network to potential members.

Being a Cooperative Council is something to be proud of, demonstrating a genuine commitment to cooperative innovation, best practices, and the communities we serve.

We look forward to welcoming many new members to the CCIN over the coming year, joining a cohort of like-minded local authorities committed to delivering the best local cooperative public services to our communities.
